Stacie Reed - a beautiful 16-year-old young lady, a freshman student at Osbourn Park High School, Virginia with a bright future. A very outgoing individual, loving life and people. Her dream? To become the first female Navy Seal.

Kristie Reed - a beautiful 14-year-old eighth grade student at Parkside Middle School, Virginia. Full of life and beginning to discover who she was, and developing dreams of her own.

**On

Stacie and Kristie were brutally attacked in their Yorkshire, Virginia home. Stacie in an attempted rape, was viciously stabbed and killed. The perpetrator then waited in their home over two hours for Kristie to return home from school.

After finding Stacie dead in her bedroom, Kristie, met by the perpetrator, was forced to the basement, bound with her own shoelaces, raped, strangled, wrists cut, stabbed, and her throat severely slashed. The perpetrator left, knowing she was dead. However, miraculously Kristie survived!

For the past eleven years having endured countless Motions, Hearings and two Capitol Murder trials, the family's fights for justice in the crimes against Stacie and Kristie, came to an end on March 18, 2010. Justice was served. The offender was executed.

Lorraine, Stacie and Kristie's mother, decided to take a stand and make a difference. Since January, 1999, Lorraine has been vocal about her daughters' case and continues her victim advocacy. Detective Richard Leonard, the Master Detective assigned to the case, joins her. Together they offer, "The Impact of Victimization" seminars to victims, law enforcement agencies, victim witness programs, prosecuting and defense attorneys, universities (political science students) and inmates.

Detective Leonard, who at the time of the crime was with the Prince William County Police Department, and is currently with the Stafford Sheriff's Office, presents an overview from the law enforcement standpoint. Detective Leonard states, "Law enforcement officers have been trained for years, that the criminal is their main focus, in this case the

criminal was captured six hours later. Despite professional training, there are no textbooks to teach us how to deal with victims and their families who are left behind to deal with the horror and aftermath."

Lorraine said, "Little did I know that morning when I dropped Stacie off at school our life, as we knew it, would forever be changed because of one person's jealousy and rage." "As victims," Lorraine continued, "we found changes needing to be made where victims are concerned. We assumed we would be included in every aspect. Not so! We needed to find out why."

In the search for justice, we found most of our answers, but we also met some extraordinary people and learned there are those willing to become involved and make a difference.

The years since the unthinkable occurred, have been painful for Lorraine, Kristie and the rest of their family. Knowing how hard Stacie and Kristie fought for their lives is the fuel that feeds Lorraine's courage to focus, stay positive and work hard for the justice her girls and other victims deserve.

Lorraine, Kristie and their family find hope and healing by reaching out to others, "If we have helped one victim, we have succeeded in our journey." Says Lorraine.
